BLAST FROM THE PAST!

IN THE REAR VIEW MIRROR by Skip Riggs

During our visit to Richmond, California to visit the "Red Oak" Victory ship, President Dave Adams asked me about some of the early events staged by the Bay Area Thunderbird Owners Club. It got me to thinking that there might be some interest from current club members about the origins of the club and some of the events we used to stage during the early years. In that vane I asked Jean Riley if she would like me to report some of these happenings in WNIB, since I am about the only one left who may remember them. In that spirit, here goes.

Having been separated from the U. S. Air Force in early 1957 and returning to the Bay Area to live and work, my first move after securing employment was to purchase a new 1957 Ford Thunderbird from Vad Jelton Ford Sales on Broadway in Oakland. I was very proud of that car and entered it in the first Lake Merritt Concours d' Elegance later that summer. I was lucky enough to take First Place in Class (still have the trophy), and met several other owners of sports type cars that were entered in the show. One of them was a man named John Algy who was a member of the Highland Touring Club located in Oakland. John graciously invited me to become a member of his club, and I attended the next meeting with John a couple of weeks later. When asked to stand and introduce myself and announce the make and model of my car, I answered with my name and that I was the proud owner of a new Ford Thunderbird. You can imagine the laughs and comments I received after that statement. I was reminded that the Highland Touring Club was dedicated to real sports cars and the Thunderbird was not accepted in that category of cars.

Upon returning home I told my wife about the treatment the car and I had received and vowed to find a club dedicated to just the Thunderbird. I contacted Josh Hogue who did an automotive column for the San Francisco Chronicle newspaper requesting information about such a club. Josh told me that to his knowledge there was no club for our car although there were clubs for Jaguar, MG, Triumph and Corvettes. It was then that I decided to start a club of our own. The rest is history.

Janie and I rented the Lake Merritt Boat House from the City of Oakland for a certain date in April of 1958 and planned to invite every Thunderbird owner we could contact before that date. We then made up penny post cards with the appropriate information listed on the card along with contact information and the scheduled date and place for our first meeting. We spent about 5 weeks driving around Oakland, Berkeley, San Leandro and Hayward looking for Thunderbirds. When we spotted one, we would either speak with the owner or place a card on the windshield of the car with the information about starting a club.

On the scheduled date we had some 33 people show up. I presided over the first meeting and it went well. There seemed to be a great deal of enthusiasm for this type of club and all who attended agreed to join in. Elections were held with myself being elected President; George Rudy of Richmond Vice President; Jane Riggs as Recording Secretary; Faye Edwards as Corresponding Secretary and Dick Nagle of Oakland as Treasurer. One of the attendees was a fellow named Art Horsfall who happened to be a sales person at Cirimele Ford in Oakland who offered the use of his firm's showroom as our meeting place for our second meeting. Art was soon elected as Vice President to replace George Rudy who found he did not have the time to devote to the new club office. Initiation Fee was set at \$10.00 with dues set at \$1.00 per month or \$10.00 per year payable in advance.

We immediately began to plan club events with our first event to take place on May 18th 1958. It was to be a picnic at Marsh Creek Park, just outside Clayton, Ca. We had a good turnout which included a stop at "Pioneer Village" in Lafayette on the way. I mention this because one of our members, Jack Taylor who was a professional musician whose group worked at "Pioneer Village". Their theme song was entitled "Lullaby in Birdland" which became our club theme song and I also used part of the wording when I produced our newsletter calling it WNIBL "What's New In Birdland".

Our next planned event was an overnighter to Hoberg's Resort in Lake County, Ca. near Clear Lake. We met at Jack London Square in Oakland in two groups to caravan to Hoberg's. One group departed June 21st, and the second group the next day due to work schedules. While at Hoberg's we planned a Gymkhana. For those of you not conversant with sports car lingo, a Gymkhana is a timed event over a closed course running against a clock. The course was set up with pylons in the parking lot of the hotel. This almost ended up in disaster! We soon found out that our cars were not as nimble as the foreign imported sports cars and we almost had a couple of roll over's by lead footed Thunderbird drivers. It all turned out OK though and we had lots of fun kidding the "hot rodders" in the group after all was said and done.

At the July meeting it was suggested and discussed that we incorporate the club. This was due to the fact that we learned that on an organized club function, if someone were injured the entire club membership could be held liable. We engaged an attorney and proceeded to incorporate the club under the laws of the state of California, which gave the membership limited liability. This is the main reason why, later on when we were approached by Vic Take about taking over his fledgling national Thunderbird Club, we refused his request. Vic had placed an ad in Road and Track magazine inviting Thunderbird owners across the country to join CTCL.

Our club later on decided to become part of CTCL after it had been incorporated in California and headquartered in San Francisco. This was done some time later. In July we had another picnic event at Brighton Park as well as a dinner and dance at the "Happy Valley Inn" which had been the former "Pioneer Village" in Lafayette. This was set up by our musician member Jack Taylor with your choice of either fish or steak dinner for \$2.50 per person including dinner, tax and cover charge. Can you imagine? Our next event in July was a night rally on July 26th. The rally was a popular event among sports car owners and ours was set up in the hills of Moraga. For rallying, there were several options for directions. In this one, each car owner was given a set of printed instructions to follow with the beginning and ending mileage determining the winner. In this rally, First Place was won by a Karmann Ghia owner; Second Place went to Dick Nagle our Treasurer and Third Place went to our own Lew Edwards in his 56 Buckskin Thunderbird. We did allow other sports car owners to participate in some of our timed events. It was a whole other world back then. Drivers would actually wave at each other when passing on the road.

Other rally's we put on were Poker Rally's and Hound and Hare Rally's. The Poker Rally is self-explanatory and in the Hound and Hare event, one lead car drives over the proposed route. At each turn he makes, he drives approximately 1/4 mile past the turn and drops a bag of flour to indicate the direction traveled. Each participating car would have to go to each turn, try to figure out which direction the "rabbit" had taken and try to follow the route. The winning car would be the car with the least amount of traveled mileage from the start. Lots of fun!

In the October issue of WNIBL we began a feature entitled "In This Corner" in which we focused on a particular member of the club and his contributions to the club. This was later changed to "In The Spotlight" and was a feature of the newsletter for several months thereafter.

At the November meeting of the club, an amendment to our constitution was passed to read: "We resolve to amend Article III, Section 1, Line 4 and Article III, Section 2m, Para. (a) to read: "Any person who is the registered owner of a 2-passenger Ford Thunderbird automobile may become an Active Member of this Club and be entitled to all of its privileges upon his or her payment of the stated initiation fee and is entitled to continuing membership upon the payment of dues and assessments hereinafter and upon complying and qualifying under the requirements stated herein". Boy, did this just about end the club. Reason being that Ford had come out with the four seater Thunderbird (same name, different car) and we had some folks who had traded in their two seater for a larger car and wanted to stay in the club. This fight went on for months. More about that later.

If there is interest in the current membership about this old history, I will continue in future issues of WNIBL.

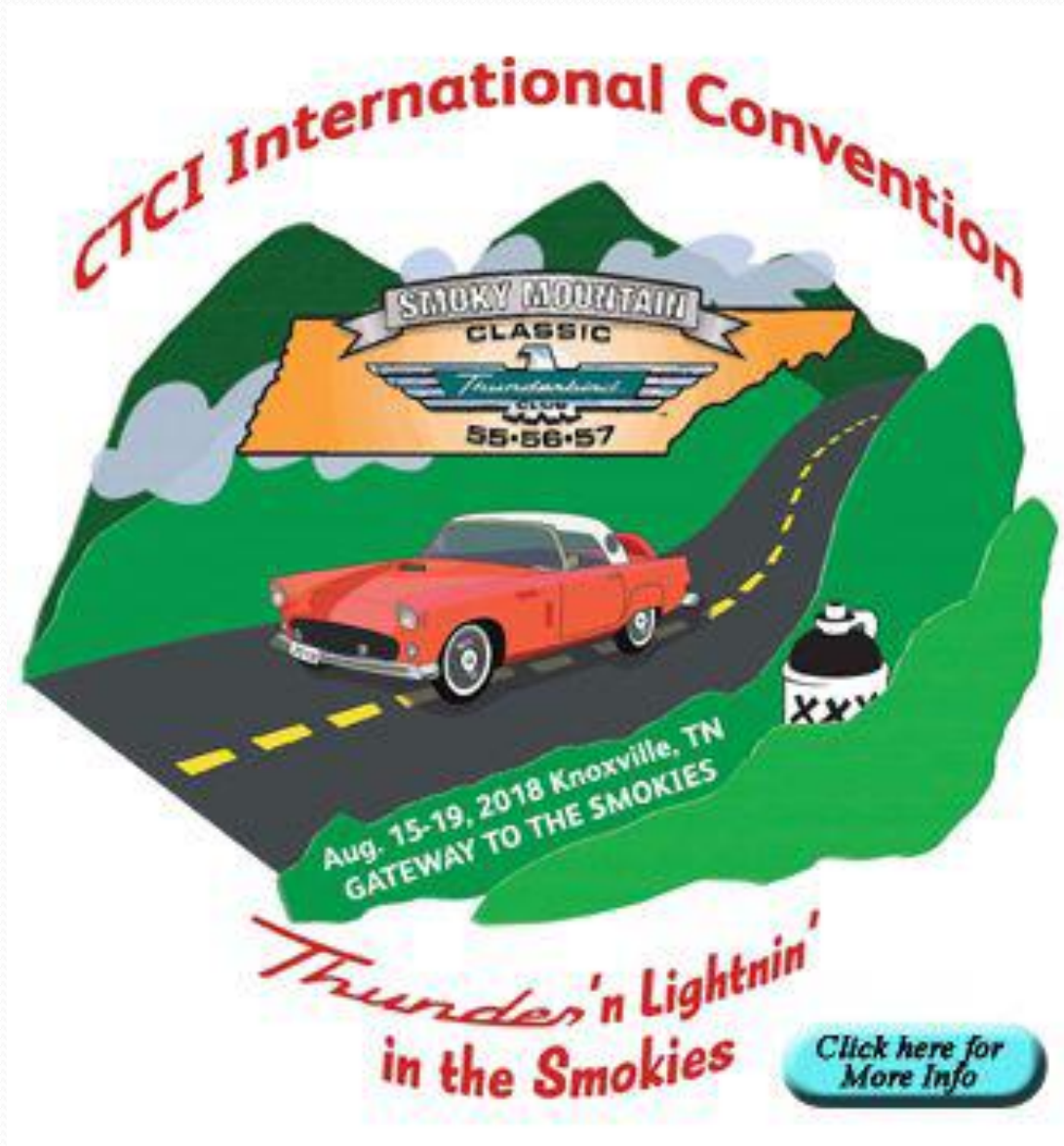
